## Invitation To The Third Training Course

We, Tokai University School of Medicine and New Health Leader Network, held "The First and Second Training Course for Future Health Leaders" for four weeks in 1996 and 1997, in collaboration with the World Health Organization Regional Office for the Western Pacific (WHO-WPRO) and the Agency for Cooperation in International Health, and with the support of the Ministry of Health and Welfare, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Japan Medical Association.

13 fellows in 1996 and 8 fellows in 1997 participated in our training course and they were at the director or the hospital chief administrator level from Health and Welfare Ministries in ten countries. The course covered matters of use in future administrative plan of health and welfare and was composed of five pillars: population issues, food and nutrition issues, acute infectious diseases, practical health economics and management, and computer training.

This training course has intended to dissolve many urgent problems waiting urgent solutions and stable issues in health related affairs such as changes of nutrition, infectious diseases, environmental conditions, and urbanization which have been altering the level, priority, character, and form of international and institutional support at family, community and regional level in changing global human environment towards next century. WHO-WPRO sended WHO fellow with scholarship to the Second Training Course.

Dr. Sang Tae Han, M.D., Ph.D., Regional director of the WHO Regional Office for the Western Pacific, strongly supported this training course, particularly direction and thinking process of health futures while preparing this course. These are the principles of our motive to create this course as important educational mission.

The Third Training Course in 1998 will focus on the creative education for health futurists who have abilities to forecast future health. The experiences from the past two courses endow us to open the third course with the charming curriculum.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation to whole people and institutions, particularly to the WHO Regional Office for the Western Pacific, the Japanese Government, Foreign Embassies in Japan, the United Nations University, Keidanren, Japan International Cooperation Agency, and the Japan Medical Association, who have contineously supported this educational and missionary work to become as real for everyone in the health care field.

## What is the Spirit of This Course?

Social, economic and political changes are occurring at a very fast pace throughout the world. In many countries these changes, together with demographic changes such as urbanization and aging of populations, have been contributing to an emerging future health situation which will be vastly different from the past and the present. In addition the world is seeing an epidemiologic shift where lifestyle related diseases are gaining importance and rapid technological advances which will modify health interventions in the future. So, the spirit of this course is "the forecast for health development in the future."

## What should Public Health Professionals do in the Future?

Health professionals of the future, especially those who specialize in public health, will have to take leadership in order to ensure that emerging challenges to health are met effectively. Planners, policy makers and managers of health systems must be able to detect, identify, make judgements and make projections of health conditions and requirements of the future. This will enable them to ensure quality, effectiveness, efficiency and continuity of health services after the 21st century.

## How does This Educational Programme Meet This Need?

Futuristic approach, prospective study, and improved action for the cost effectiveness on health quality and equity have not been included in conventional public health. Educational programme consists of 5 modules: Introductory module; Problem identification and issues analysis; Health technology assessment; Approaches and health intervention; and Health systems reform. This programme was prepared in collaboration with the WHO Western Pacific Regional Office (WPRO). The principles and philosophy of this course curriculum were printed in both brochures for 1996 and 1997 applicants. The main educational method to be used in the course/seminar will be problem-based or problem- oriented teaching and learning. Lectures and discussions in the first and second courses were evaluated using SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analysis. Lessons from the first and second courses experience will be useful for the preparation of detailed behavioral objectives and outcomes for each activity. To achieve these, work and discussions will be carried out in plenary or in small groups (4-5 per group) as well as by individuals.

## What was done in the First and the Second Training Courses?

The four-week training session was indeed a rewarding challenge, as the trainees came to absorb this extraordinary amount of the information and conducted vigorous discussions. The contents of the lectures in the First Course was published in the Tokai Journal of Experimental and Clinical Medicine in November, 1997. The report of the Second Course was published in January, 1998.

During the training course, an opened International Symposium was held at the United Nations University. In 1996 the theme was "Future Prospect of Health and Insurance Program in Developing and Developed Countries." Last year the theme was "Exchange Ideas on AIDS Control Between Developing and Developed Countries." We published the proceedings in 1996 and the press in 1997.

# How was the First and the Second Training Courses Evaluated?

WHO-WPRO highly evaluated the First Training Course and provided WHO fellowship to the Second training Course. Japanese goverment and several foundations evaluated the First and the Second Training Courses very high, and supported this project.

# How to Improve the Third Training Course from the experience of 1996 and 1997 Courses?

The following items were included in the Second Training Course.

- 1) Emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases, especially AIDS and tuberculosis, should be more extensively discussed.
- We allocated more time and classes to the computer training and the related information exchange than we did in 1996.
- 3) Industrialization and urbanization related to the change of lifestyle was included.
- 4) Lecturers and fellows could use Tokai University Library of Isehara Campus for 24 hours.
- 5) Three graduates of the first training course joined in the second training course as a lecturer in order to build the ideal training course in the world.

The Third Training Course in 1998 should be improved as follows:

- 1) Above 5 points in 1997 should be continued in 1998.
- 2) Forecasting training starts as the first session using computer.
- 3) Every morning during the training course fellows should access to information using computer or to design the future based data for health policy making in the future.
- 4) Every afternoon and evening fellows simulated or designed forecasts with professors.

## What is the Primary Goal?

The primary goal is to build new multi-disciplinary skills and abilities to meet requirements of health in the future and conductivity of future health-related actions and new priority in the fellows' home countries.

## Who can Apply?

Senior national or local level health officials with present or potential responsibility for the formulation and promotion of health policies as well as the designing and implementation of programmes. In addition to fellows from government researchers, managers and trainers in the institution and graduate students will be considered in 1998. Approximately 20 officials from any countries. The upper age limit is 45, but exceptions will be considered on a case by case basis. Applicants should have a sufficient command of spoken and written English, and also be in good health, both physically and mentally, to undergo the training.

#### Educational Board Structure is Authorized?

The Educational board structure is composed of representatives from multi-national universities, WHO collaboration center in educational development, experts from WHO, governmental organization, and International Health Futures Network of a WHO/NGO.



## How to Apply?

Applicants should send Form 1, a recommendation letter of his/her superior, a summary of his/her motive to enter the course (300 words), and personal history (curriculum viae) to the Secretary General, Dr. Isao Okazaki, M.D., Ph.D. until the end of May in 1998 for The Third Training Course (1998).

If applicants and his/her superior wish to get fund, he/she should send a letter to WHO the Regional Office of Western Pacific (Dr.Nair, N.V.K., Director, Div. of Health Infrastructure) with the recommendation letter of his/her superior. These copies should be sent to the Secretariat.

#### How to Process at The Secretariat?

#### 1. Application

The credential committee decides the acceptance of applicants. For those qualified applicants the secretariat send the official letter of acceptance, general information, and questionnaire for effective grouping of practice of computerization until the end of lune, 1998.

#### 2. Funding Support

Each applicant has different private conditions and circumstances. The secretariat examine carefully about individual requests such as self funding, his/her superior's supports, obtained WHO Fellowship, and other scholarship to comply with qualified applicant's requests as much as possible.

## How to Register?

The accepted applicants should send the Registration Form (Form 2) and the answer to questionnaire to the Secretariat as soon as possible. Tuition and accommodation fee must be received 3 weeks before the start of the training course.


