Course Objectives

Educational Aims

Social, economic and political changes are occurring at a very fast pace throughout the world. In many countries such changes, together with demographic factors such as urbanization and population aging, have been influencing an emerging future health situation vastly different from that in the past, as well as that at the present time. In addition the world is seeing an epidemiologic shift, where lifestyle-related diseases are gaining importance and, at the same time, rapid technological advances are being made which will modify health interventions in the future. Therefore, the theme of this course is "The Forecast for Health Development in the Future".

Health professionals in the future, especially those who specialize in public health, will have to show leadership in order to ensure that emerging challenges to health are met effectively. Planners, policy makers and managers of health organizations must be able to detect, identify, make judgements and then extrapolate data to forecast health conditions and requirements in the future. This will enable them to ensure quality, effectiveness, efficiency and continuity of health care in the 21st century.

Futuristic approaches, prospective studies based on evidence, and methods of improving the effectiveness of resource utilization towards better health quality and equity, have not been included in conventional public health ducation. This educational program consists of 5 modules: Introductory module; Problem identification and issues analysis; Health technology assessment; Medical approaches and health intervention; and Health system reform. This program was prepared in collaboration with The World Health Organization-Regional Office for the Western Pacific (WHO-WPRO). The main educational method used in the course will be problem-based or priority oriented teaching and learning. Lectures and discussions in the past three courses were evaluated using SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analysis. The results of analysis have been used in the preparation of detailed behavioral objectives and outcomes for each activity. In order to achieve these, work and discussions will be earried out in plenary sessions or in small groups (4-5 per group), as well as by individual study.

The primary goal of this course is to build new multi-disciplinary skills, in order to meet the requirements of public health in the future, and to facilitate and prioritize the delivery of future health services in the home countries of our fellow colleagues.

Applicants qualifications

Senior national or local level health officials, with present or potential responsibility for the formulation and promotion of health policies as well as the design and implementation of programs, are invited to apply for entry. In addition to our colleagues in government research and management positions, and those supervising training within institutions, graduate students will also be considered in 1999. The upper age limit is 45 years, but exceptions will be considered on a case by case basis. Applicants should have a sufficient command of spoken and written English, and also be in good health, both physically and mentally, in order to undergo the training.







Application and Registration

Application Procedure

Applicants should send the Application Form (Form 1), a recommendation letter from his/her superior, a summary of his/her motivations for entry to the course (approx. 300 words), and a personal history (curriculum vitae) to the Secretary General, Dr. Isao Okazaki, M.D., Ph.D. by May 31, 1999.

If any applicant wishes to receive funding, he/she should send a letter of request, together with a recommendation letter from his/her superior to Ms. L. Kerse, Director, Division of Health Infrastructure, World Health Organization-Regional Office for the Western Pacific (P.O. Box 2932 Manila, Philippine).

How applications are processed at the Secretariat

1. Applications

The credential committee is responsible for the acceptance of applicants. Successful applicants will receive from the Secretariat on official letter of acceptance, general information, and a questionnaire to enable effective grouping of participants for computer practice, by June 30, 1999.

2. Funding Support

Each applicant has different personal conditions and circumstances. The Secretariat carefully examines each individual request and consider such factors as self funding, support by professional superiors, and attainment of WHO Fellowships or other scholarships, in order to comply with the applicant's request, as much as possible.

Registation procedure

Successful applicants should send the Registration Form (Form 2) together with the completed questionnaire to the Secretariat as soon as possible. Tuition and accommodation fees must be received at least 3 weeks before the start of the training course.

Tuition Fees

The tuition fee for the 1999 course is US \$5000. Successful applicants should remit this amount by bank transfer. Account details can be found on the *Registration Form (Form 2)*.

Accommodation Fees

Accommodation including three meals each day, is available for the 4 weeks of the course, for US \$5000. Successful applicants should remit this amount to the same bank account as the tution fee.
